

THE GOD OF THE MOUNTAINS

With a new perspective of God and a new perspective of ourselves, our lives change. We are not the same coming down the mountain as we were going up the mountain.

Mountaintop experiences are great, but they don't last forever. Nor are they supposed to. We are not meant to live on top of the mountain, we just go there to get our perspectives right so that we can descend the mountain and share with others the things that we have learned.

God blesses us so that we can bless others. That's not just with our finance, that's also with our experiences, with our knowledge and with the things that we have seen and heard.

God wants us to know Him better and then He expects us to make Him known to those who don't yet know Him.

If you are willing to climb the mountain; if you are willing to take the time and make the sacrifice, what you receive from God, will be well worth your time and effort.
